On April 26, 2021, under Article 85, Arlington Town Meeting voted (222-1-2) to encourage all town entities to celebrate and recognize the heritage of the peoples indigenous to Massachusetts and Arlington by including a land acknowledgement at the beginning of the Town's public meetings.

The Arlington School Committee shall include at the beginning of its organizational meeting, at the beginning of its first regular meeting in October (or such other meeting date as is approximate to "Indigenous Peoples Day" per Title I, Article 6 of the Town Bylaws), and as part of graduation ceremonies, a land acknowledgement shall be read in a substantially similar form to the following:

"We acknowledge that the Town of Arlington is located on the ancestral lands of the Massachusett Tribe, the tribe of Indigenous peoples from whom the Colony, Province, and Commonwealth have taken their names. We pay our respects to the ancestral bloodline of the Massachusett Tribe and their descendants who still inhabit historic Massachusett territories today."

SEPAC Purpose: Advise, Advocate, Guide

A SEPAC is an **advisory council**. They gather information from families and make recommendations that can be used by decision-makers and local leaders. A SEPAC's purpose is to **advise**, **advocate**, and **offer guidance**, not to decide policy.

An effective SEPAC can:

- Help improve educational outcomes and well-being for all students, including those with disabilities.
- 2. Help identify unmet needs.
- 3. Help shape the development of programs, services and policies, as well as improve district culture.





Five-Year Strategic Plan

Vision: The vision of the Arlington Public Schools is to be an equitable educational community where all learners feel a sense of belonging, experience growth and joy, and are empowered to shape their own futures and contribute to a better world.

 - The strategic plan measures this by looking at the percentage of students meeting or exceeding MCAS Standards and data from experiential surveys

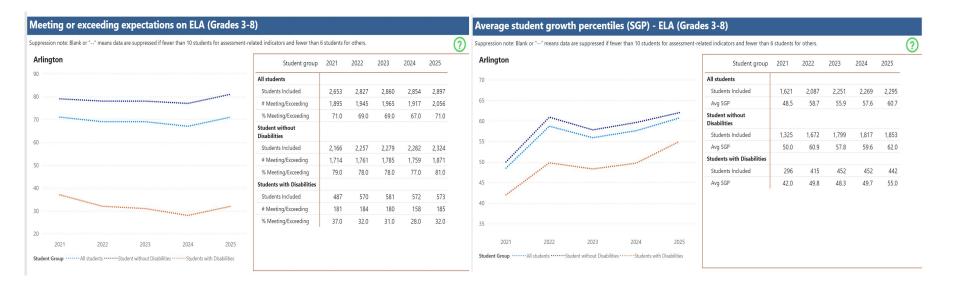
Student Growth Performance (SGP)

- Asks:
 - How much academic progress did a student or group of students make in one year, as measured by the MCAS tests, in relation to their statewide academic peers?
- How is this measured?
 - Comparing the MCAS scores of a student or group of students to students in the same grade statewide who received similar scores on the previous two years of MCAS assessments. For example, in spring 2024, a student's performance is compared to that of their academic peers who scored similarly on both the 2023 and 2022 MCAS tests

Understanding the difference

Q. If my district's student growth percentile is increasing, does that mean my district's percentage of students who are meeting or exceeding expectations is increasing?

A. *Not necessarily.* Achievement on the MCAS tests is *not* dependent on how other students across the state score. SGP, however, *is* calculated based on performance relative to academic peers across the state.

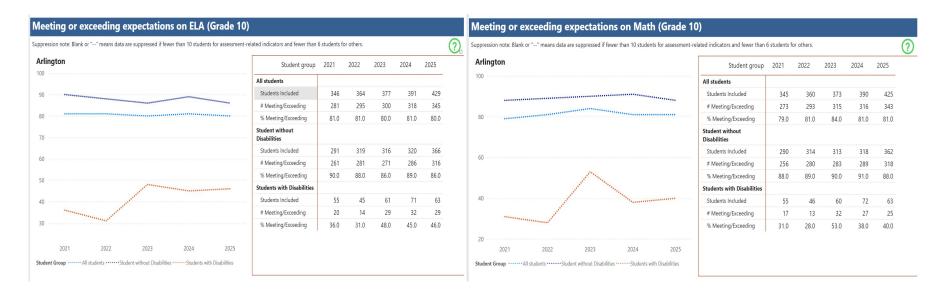

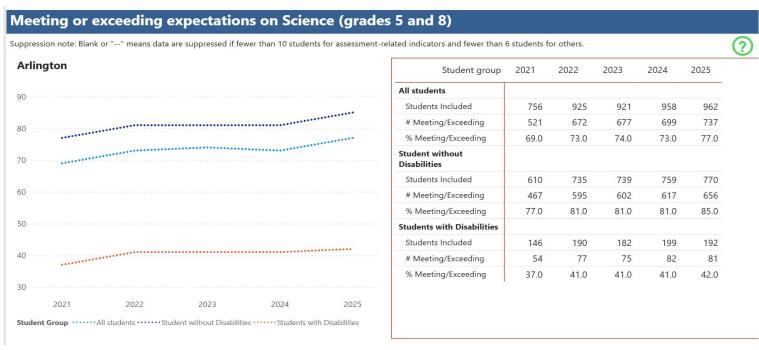

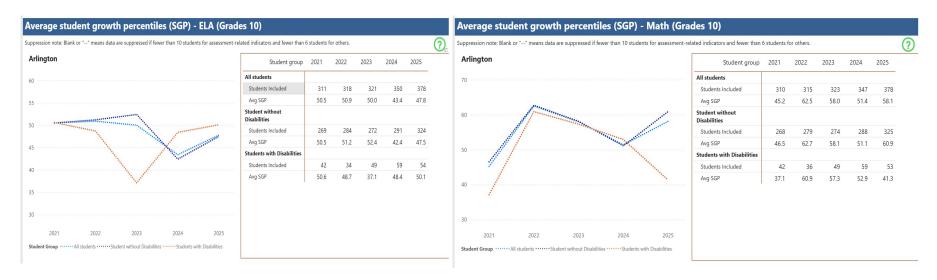

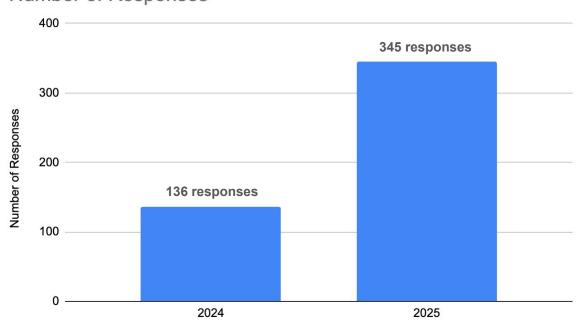

Number of Responses



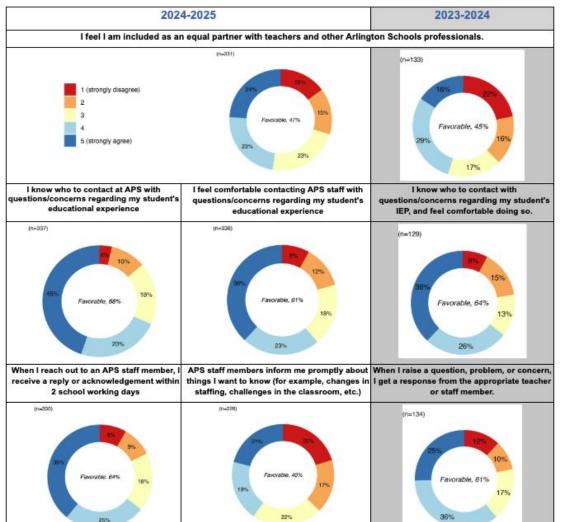


Who responded to the survey? Everybody.

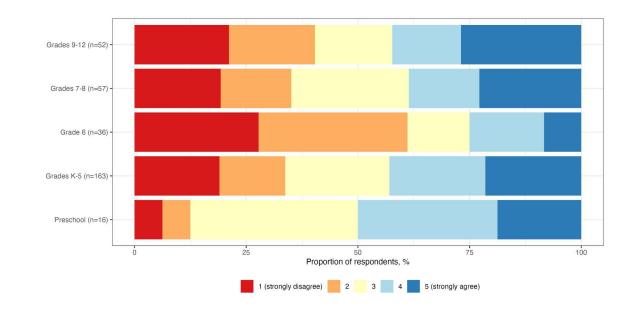

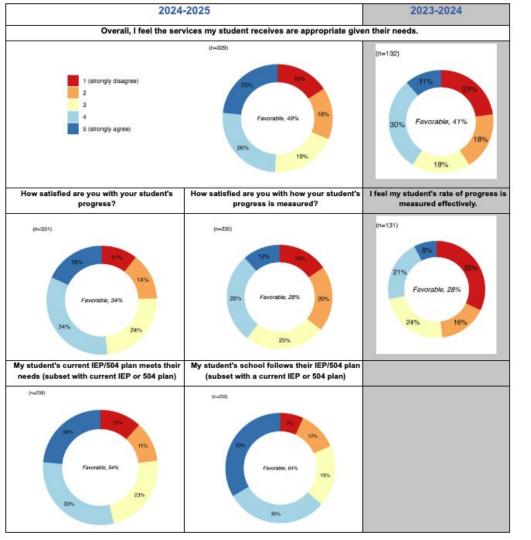
- Strong relationships with specific teachers and staff (42%), who were described as empathetic and communicative.
- equal partnership with teachers, and Arlington Schools professionals remaining essentially unchanged, with a 47% favorable rating in 2024–2025 vs. 45% in 2023–2024.
- Communication and collaboration gaps (reported by 96% of open-ended responses), including delayed or incomplete responses, unclear points of contact, and inconsistent information across schools.

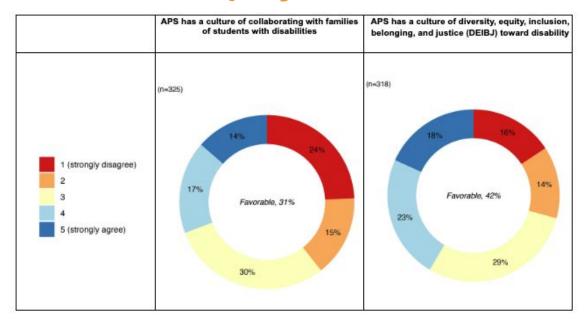
Service Delivery & Progress Monitoring

- Positive experiences with targeted supports and services (62%), especially targeted reading instruction (e.g., Orton Gillingham), counseling, and academic supports.
- Inconsistent perception of IEP and 504 services (49% rated services appropriate for need, an improvement from 41% in 2023-2024), and uncertainty about whether plans are followed with fidelity (64% favorable, not measured in 2023-2024).
- Limited satisfaction with progress measurement (28%, no change from 2023-2024) and progress itself (34%, not measured in 2023-2024), with caregivers citing unclear or inconsistent data on student growth.

Opportunities

- Expanded understanding: This is about all APS not just SPED
 - Most students with IEPs and 504s spend the vast majority of their time in the general education environment
 - MTSS & DCAP will be critical
- Investments in Universal Design for Learning to ensure scaling with fidelity
 - Selection of new curricula that meet UDL standards
 - Training and appropriate supports for educators that create their own content to ensure it meets UDL standards
- Review of SPED services and progress monitoring approaches to ensure that what is working is replicated
- Include caregivers in the IEP goal writing training so teachers and parents are speaking the same language
 - Academic goals
 - Social Emotional and Behavioral goals
 - Executive Function goals

Culture & Equity



Student belonging and inclusion and APS culture:
 25% of open-ended responses identified this as an area of concern, not measured in 2023-2024, especially for neurodivergent students or those with social-emotional needs.

• **Perceived inequities in access:** 73% of survey participants reported using personal resources to secure appropriate services. These included private evaluations (96% of this group), using the assistance of an advocates (40%) or attorneys (13%). Qualitatively, caregivers reported a "negative experience requiring substantial personal resources with both monetary and non-monetary costs" in 20% of open-ended responses.



Four Holistic Student Support Domains

Students bring their whole selves to school and use their whole selves to learn, therefore MTSS uses an integrated and holistic approach to planning for students' strengths and needs.

The updated Massachusetts MTSS Blueprint prioritizes four student domains, which now include School Belonging and Health & Wellbeing. This reflects research over the past decade that has expanded MTSS beyond academics and behavior. 444.744.84303.132

While they are described separately here, the four domains almost always intersect and work together to reinforce each other.



DOMAIN 1

School Belonging

All students feel a strong connection to their school community. School is a place where positive relationships flourish, every student is meaningfully engaged in school life (e.g., academic classes, extracurricular activities, etc.), and everyone feels safe, valued, and empowered to contribute their unique talents and perspectives.



DOMAIN 2

Academic Success

All students engage in grade-level instruction or beyond that is real-world, relevant, and interactive.



DOMAIN 3

Social, Emotional & Behavioral Development

All students develop the social-emotional skills they need to succeed in school and life, supported by positive, data-informed behavior support strategies.



DOMAIN 4

Health & Wellbeing

All students are supported holistically, which includes attention to their physical and mental wellbeing, so they can fully engage in learning. Support is delivered through school-based efforts and strategic coordination with families and community care providers.

Executive Summary

This report discusses the findings of the fourth annual Special Education Parent Advisory Council (SEPAC) Survey, which was developed and distributed by SEPAC with the support of the Arlington Public School District administration. The purpose of this survey is to provide all Arlington stakeholders with a better understanding of parent/caregiver experiences with Special Education in the Arlington Public Schools. These data can provide actionable insight into areas of common experience among Arlington families who have students with disabilities. They also form a foundation for parent/caregiver advocacy as well as collaboration between the Arlington Public Schools and families as APS moves forward with its strategic plan.

There were 338 survey respondents this year, a 249% increase in respondents over the 2023-2024 academic year. The distributions of current grade level, eligibility status, and disability were:

- **Grade level:** Preschool (6%), kindergarten-5th grade (49%), 6th grade (11%), 7th-8th grade (17%), and 9th-12th grade / post-grade 12 (17%);
- Eligibility status: IEP (including students with both an IEP and 504 plan) (72%); 504 plan (15%); ineligible students with disabilities (12%).
- Disability: Seventy-four percent of respondents reported on their student's
 disability/condition in a free text format which allowed for a more granular response than
 the umbrella categories of disability defined by IDEA. The most common categories
 reported this year were ADHD (39%), Autism (23%), Anxiety (19%), and Dyslexia or
 Specific Learning Disability in Reading (18%).

2025 Survey: New Questions

In the fourth year of this annual survey, the survey was expanded to account for a broader range of experiences of caregivers who have a student with a disability in order to include not only those whose student has been found eligible for an IEP and currently enrolled in an in-district school, but rather all families who live in Arlington and have experiences with special education.

This year, new questions were added to attempt to better understand parent/caregiver perceptions related to culture and belonging.

Summary of Findings

The 2024–2025 SEPAC Survey represents the fourth consecutive year of data collection to understand the experiences of Arlington Public Schools (APS) parents and caregivers of students with disabilities. This year's participation increased significantly to **338 respondents**, more than doubling the previous year's response rate. Caregivers represented students across all grades and eligibility categories, including those with IEPs (72%), 504 plans (15%), and students not currently receiving formal services (12%).

Strengths

Overall, caregivers identified many dedicated and caring educators, counselors, and specialists as the greatest strengths of APS special education. Key positive themes include:

- Positive experiences with targeted supports and services (62%), especially targeted reading instruction (e.g. Orton Gillingham), counseling, and academic supports.
- Strong relationships with specific teachers and staff (42%), who were described as empathetic and communicative.

These results underscore that when communication is strong, staff are consistent, and supports are individualized, families feel valued and students thrive.

Areas for Growth

Despite clear bright spots, the survey also reveals **systemic challenges** and declining satisfaction in key areas, particularly as students move into middle and high school. The most prevalent concerns include:

- Feelings of caregivers as having an equal partnership with teachers, and Arlington Schools professionals remaining essentially unchanged, with a 47% favorable rating in 2024–2025 vs. 45% in 2023–2024.
- Communication and collaboration gaps (reported by 96% of open-ended responses), including delayed or incomplete responses, unclear points of contact, and inconsistent information across schools.
- Inconsistent delivery of IEP and 504 services (49% rated services appropriate for need; yet an improvement from 41% in 2023-2024), and uncertainty about whether plans are followed with fidelity (64% favorable, not measured in 2023-2024).
- Limited satisfaction with progress measurement (28%, no change from 2023-2024) and progress itself (34%, not measured in 2023-2024), with caregivers citing unclear or inconsistent data on student growth.
- Concerns about student belonging and inclusion (25% of open-ended responses), especially for neurodivergent students or those with social-emotional needs.
- Perceived inequities in access, as 73% of 338 survey participants reported using at least one non-APS resource to secure appropriate services e.g. private evaluations (96% of this group), using the assistance of an advocate (40%) or attorneys (13%). Qualitatively, many caregivers reported a "negative experience requiring substantial personal resources with both monetary and non-monetary costs" (20% of open-ended responses).

- Low confidence in APS culture: only 31% of caregivers agreed APS has a culture of collaborating with families of students with disabilities; while 42% felt APS fosters a culture of diversity, equity, inclusion, belonging, and justice (DEIBJ) toward disability.
- APS is a low referral source for special education evaluations: Requests for student evaluations are driven largely by families (58%); while 13% of respondents indicated that an APS educator or staff member initiated a special education referral.

Caregivers also expressed **fatigue from navigating complex systems**, inconsistent service quality across schools, and frustration with transition points—particularly from elementary to middle school.

Opportunities to Learn More

The 2024–2025 survey broadened its reach to include caregivers of students with disabilities who may not currently receive services. Building on this, **future surveys should aim to:**

- Capture more responses from caregivers of **high school and Ottoson students**, and from **racially and linguistically diverse families**.
- Explore the relationship between staff consistency, communication practices, and family trust.
- Examine how perceptions of inclusion and belonging evolve over time.
- Identify **effective communication models** rated highly by families to share districtwide.

Together, these findings provide actionable insight into both the successes and ongoing challenges within APS special education, offering a roadmap for strengthening collaboration, equity, and outcomes for students with disabilities and their families.

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Glossary / List of Abbreviations

504 plan A 504 Plan helps a child with special health care needs to fully participate in

school. Usually, a 504 Plan is used by a general education student who is not eligible for special education services. A 504 Plan lists accommodations related to the child's disability and required by the child to participate in the general

Survey Administration and Overview

The survey was available to complete online and in English only. Parents/caregivers learned about the survey via email (if they were part of the SEPAC mailing list), social media, the superintendent's update, and school newsletters. Caregivers were encouraged to respond regardless of their child's enrollment status in APS; or whether or not the district had found their student eligible for an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) or a 504. Respondents with more than one child/student with potential special education needs were instructed to fill out one survey per child/student.

The 2024-2025 survey included 34 items across 8 domains:

- demographics (5 items);
- student's disability and current services (4 items);
- communication and parent/school partnership (7 items);
- progress and progress measurement (5 items);
- evaluation and identification (3 items);
- service delivery (3 items);
- culture (3 items); and
- SEPAC communication/feedback (4 items).

All items were optional; respondents were instructed to skip any questions that were not relevant to them or which they would prefer not to answer. See <u>Appendix Table 1</u> for a complete list of survey items and response options.

Data analysis was conducted April through October 2025.

Analysis Methods

Analysis of quantitative data: Descriptive statistics (frequency counts, percentages, number of missing observations) are presented for each survey item. Results are presented for all respondents overall and for key subgroups of interest (current grade level, current services and IEP eligibility category). Subgroup analyses should be interpreted with the context of sample sizes for those subgroups. For survey items that had a potential risk of identifying individuals (grade level, gender identity, race/ethnicity, category of disability), select groups were combined to avoid reporting on data with fewer than 6 students.

Analysis of qualitative data: A board member removed any potentially identifying information from open-ended responses prior to analysis. As part of the deidentification process, gendered terms such as daughter or son were edited to 'child' or 'student', and all pronouns were edited to they/them/their. Then, a team of two coders used a thematic analysis approach to code the data. Codes were then consolidated into themes – with the assistance of one other coder – which are presented in this report alongside deidentified example quotes. The frequencies of each theme are reported with the percentage calculated out of the denominator of respondents providing at least one open-ended response. Each theme reflects the responses of a minimum of 5% of respondents.

Contextual Information

Based on data available publicly from DESE, as of January 2025, there were a total of 6,113 students enrolled in Arlington Public Schools. These enrollment numbers include students enrolled at Menotomy Preschool (n=100), one of seven elementary schools (K-5th grade; n=2,844), Gibbs School (6th grade; n=529), Ottoson Middle School (7-8th grade, n=963), and Arlington High School (9-12th grade, n=1,677). A total of 1,089 students within the Arlington School *District* had disabilities (defined by having an Individualized Education Program [IEP]), of whom 1,036 were *enrolled* in Arlington Public Schools [Reference 1].

The three most common disability types among students with IEPs statewide and by district are available through RADAR. Using the most recently available data at the time of data analysis (2024-2025), the most common disabilities in Arlington School District were:

- Autism (22%),
- Specific Learning Disability (21%),
- Heath* (19%).

The distribution of most common disabilities within Arlington closely matched the distribution in Massachusetts statewide, which were Specific Learning Disability (23%), Autism (17%), and Health* (15%). Some notable differences are observed when comparing these distributions to those of "Town Manager 12" districts (see table below). [Reference 2].

Respondent Demographics, Disabilities and Conditions, and Current Services

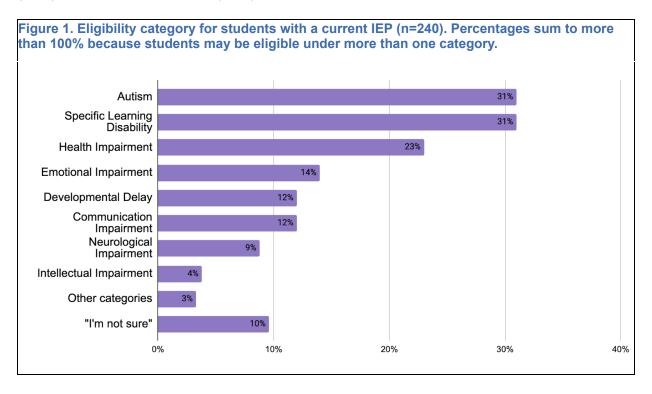
There were 338 survey respondents. Student demographics are presented in **Table 1** and current services are presented in **Table 2**. Eighty-four percent of students attended school within APS and 16% had attended school outside of APS. At the time of survey completion (i.e., "currently"), 72% of students had an IEP, 15% had a 504 Plan, and 12% had neither. The survey respondents represent approximately 20% of caregivers of students attending school within APS with an IEP (~198/1,036); we cannot provide a precise response rate because the timing of the survey does not align with the timing of reporting to DESE. In general, response rates were higher (approximately 20%) among students with IEPs in earlier grade levels (kindergarten through 8th grade), and lower (approximately 10%) among students with IEPs in later grade levels (9th-12th grade). We cannot provide an estimate of the response rate for students with 504 plans, since the denominator is not publicly available. Similarly, we cannot provide an estimate of the response rate for students with disabilities but without a current IEP or 504 plan, since that denominator is unknown.

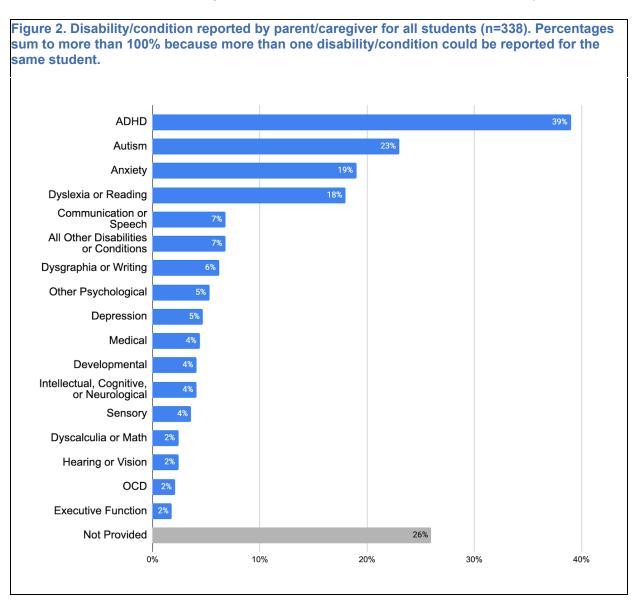

Among students enrolled within APS and with an IEP, 19% (38/198) were reported by caregivers as being assigned to an SLC. **Figure 1** displays the IEP eligibility category among students with an IEP, as reported by caregivers. All eligibility categories were represented in the survey sample, with the three most common categories of Autism (31%), Specific learning disability (31%), and Health Impairment (23%).

Figure 2 displays all disabilities/conditions (including those that are diagnosed or suspected) reported by caregivers. Consistent with the most common IEP eligibility categories, the disabilities/conditions that were among the most common to be reported were ADHD (38%), Autism (23%), and Dyslexia/Reading (18%). Anxiety was reported for 19% of students. These percentages are calculated out of the full sample of 338 respondents, even though 26% did not provide a response; some caregivers opted to leave this item blank due to privacy concerns.



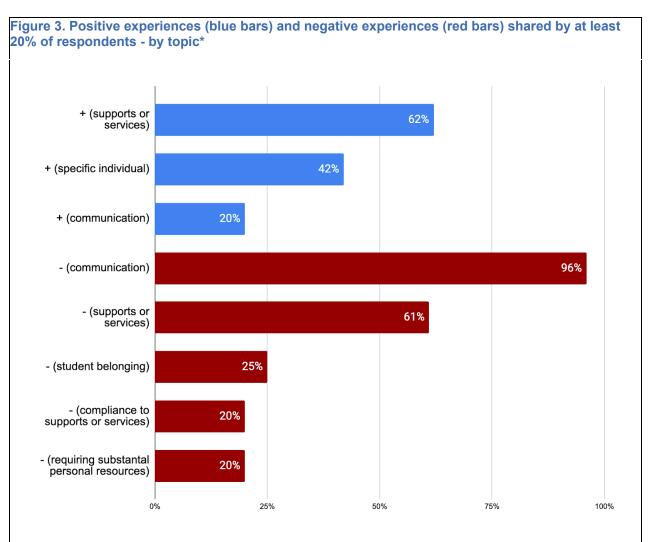
Qualitative Data: Analysis of Responses to Open-Ended Questions

Respondents had the opportunity to provide free-text responses to four open-ended questions:

- 1. Is there anything else you would like to share about communication? (149 respondents)
- 2. What supports have been most effective for your student's educational experience? (220 respondents)
- 3. What concerns do you have about your student's educational experience? (215 respondents)
- 4. Is there anything else you would like to share about progress? (151 respondents)

Two-hundered fifty-eight individuals provided at least one open-ended response across all four open-ended questions. Thematic analysis of the open-ended responses revealed 6 themes regarding positive experiences (**Table 3**), 16 themes regarding negative experiences (**Table 4**), and 3 themes regarding concerns about the future (**Table 5**). Counts indicate the total number of respondents who shared a comment that was coded with the associated theme. Percentages are calculated based on the total number of respondents who shared an open-ended quote (n=258). Counts and percentages within and between the three tables are not mutually exclusive. In other words, respondents may have shared comments corresponding to multiple themes.

Figure 3 provides a visual representation of experiences shared by at least 20% of respondents.



Within the same open-ended response, some participants provided both positive and negative feedback on a) communication and b) supports or services, which is why the percentages for the corresponding positive and negative experiences exceed 100%.

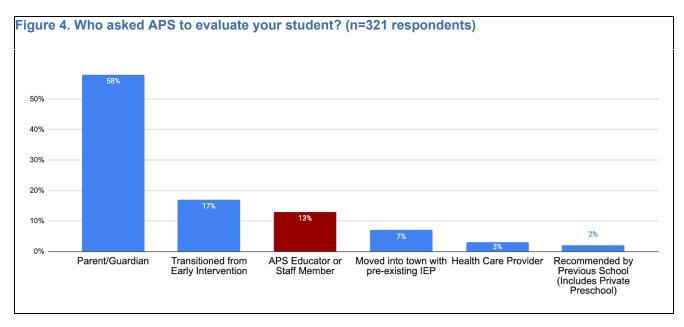

Evaluation and Identification

With respect to the caregivers' experiences with Special Education evaluation and identification of disabilities for their student, it was most common for a parent/guardian to ask APS to evaluate their student (58%) and for a neuropsychologist to identify the disability (28%). Full responses to these questions are displayed in **Figure 4** and **Figure 5**.

Of the 338 respondents to the survey, 247 (73%) reported using non-APS services to support them during the process of securing support for their child, all of which bring with them some level of financial burden to families. Of this pool of respondents, 40% of caregivers reported using the aid of an advocate and 13% reported using the aid of a lawyer (**Table 6**).



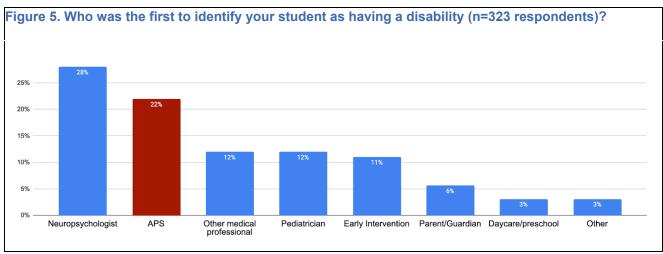

Communication/Collaboration and Service Delivery/Progress Monitoring

Communication / Collaboration - Current Year and Prior Year

Results to this set of items are presented side-by-side for the current year and prior year to provide additional context. However, results from the current and prior years should not be directly compared as respondents in the current year may not have participated in the prior year, and vice versa.

Responses to items on communication and collaboration are displayed in **Figures 6A, 6B, and 6C**. For the current year, the majority of respondents responded favorably regarding knowing who to contact (68%) and receiving a timely response (64%), but only 47% and 40%, respectively, responded favorably to feeling included as an equal partner; and being made promptly aware about "things I want to know".

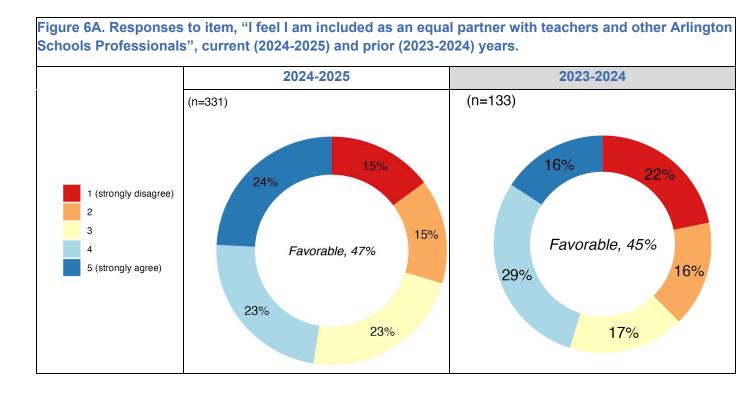
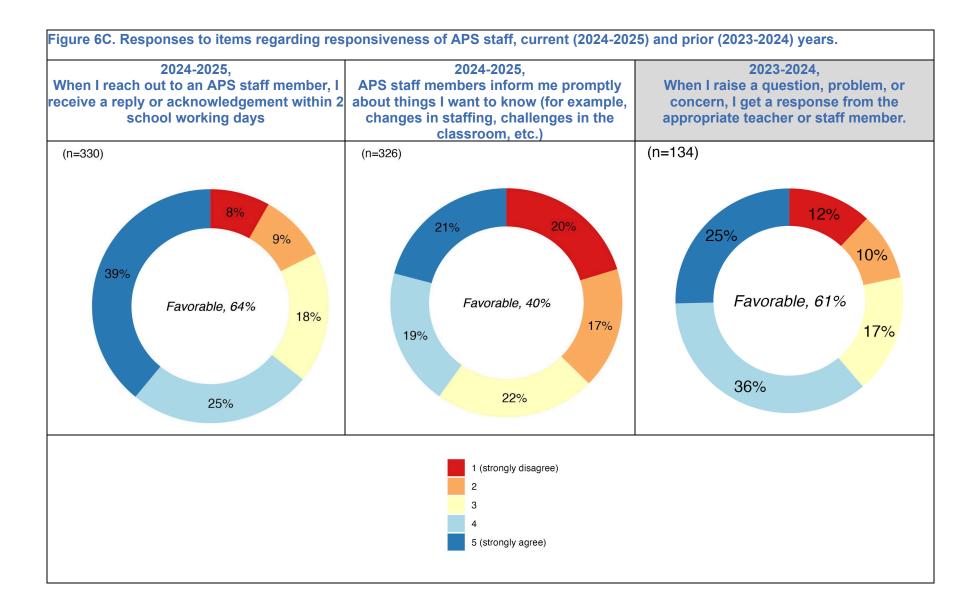
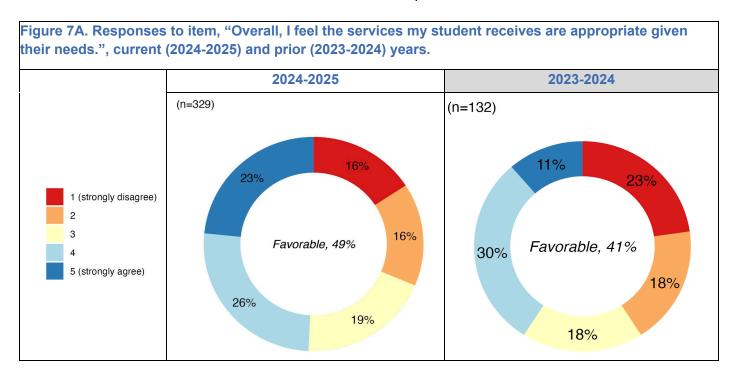


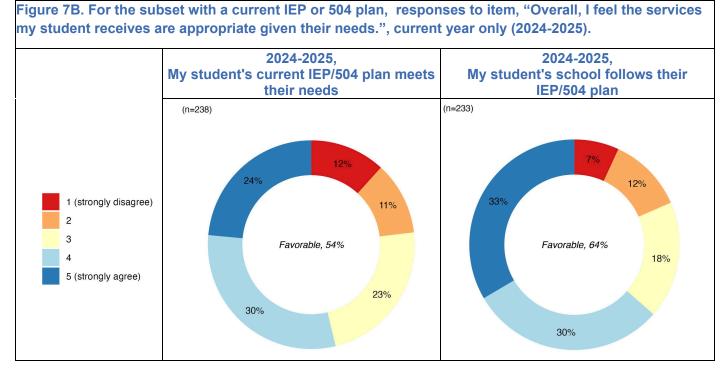
Figure 6B. Responses to items regarding contacting APS staff with questions/concerns, current (2024-2025) and prior (2023-2024) vears. 2024-2025, 2024-2025, 2023-2024, I know who to contact at APS with I feel comfortable contacting APS staff with I know who to contact with questions/concerns regarding my student's questions/concerns regarding my questions/concerns regarding my student's educational experience student's educational experience IEP, and feel comfortable doing so. (n=129)(n=337)(n=336)8% 10% 12% 15% 38% 38% 45% 18% Favorable, 64% Favorable, 61% Favorable, 68% 13% 18% 23% 26% 23% 1 (strongly disagree) 5 (strongly agree)

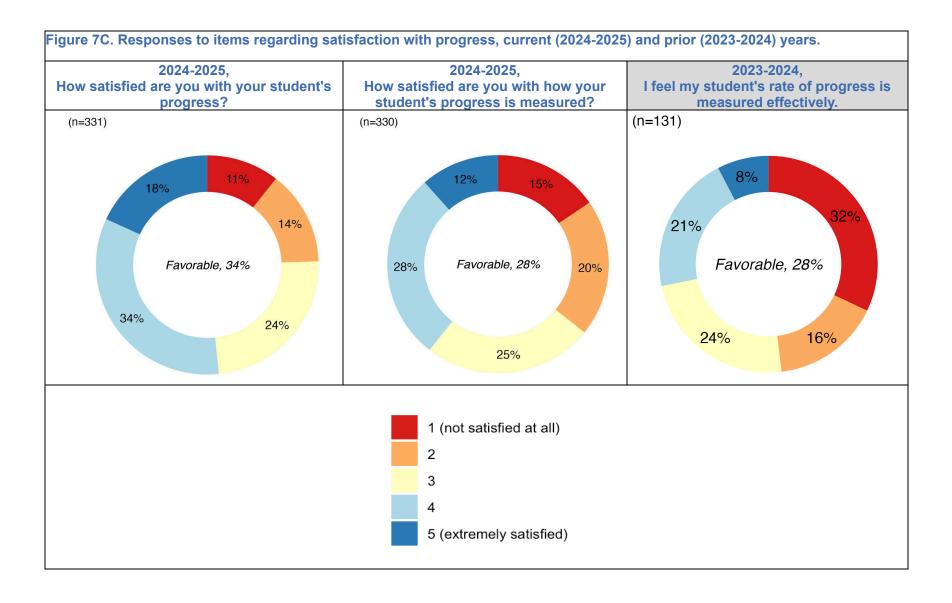


Service Delivery / Progress Monitoring - Current Year and Prior Year

Responses to items on service delivery and progress monitoring are displayed in **Figures 7A, 7B, and 7C.**. For the current year, a minority of respondents answered favorably regarding the appropriateness of service given needs (49%), their student's progress in general (34%), and progress measurement (28%). Among the subset of students with current IEP or 504 plans, 54% and 64%, respectively, responded favorably when asked if their student's IEP/504 plan meets their needs and if their student's school follows their IEP/504 plan.



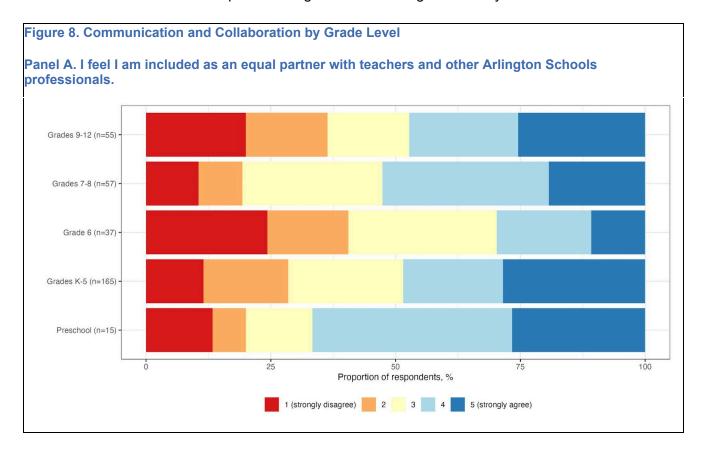


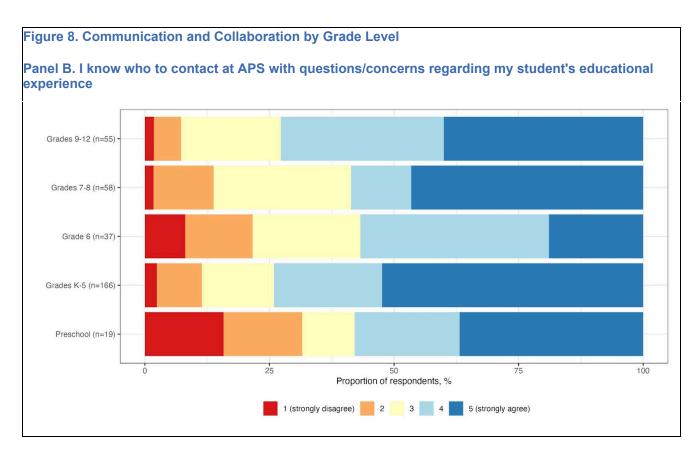


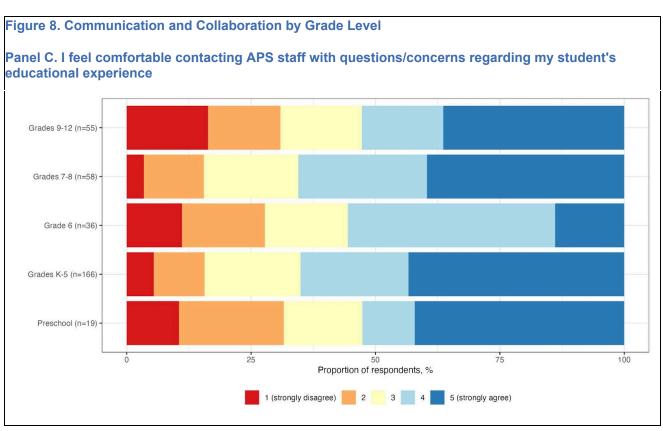

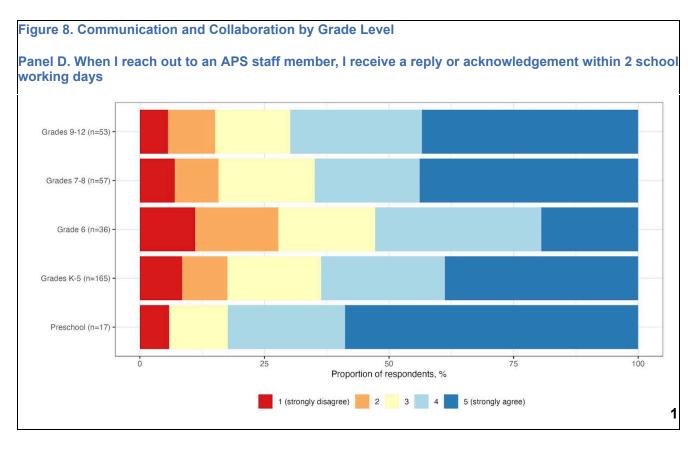

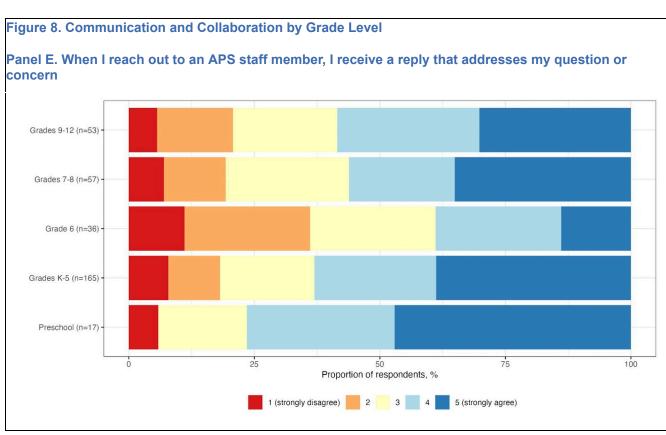
- For **communication and collaboration**, we observe variability with the following notable observation: For several items, higher proportions of caregivers of students in 6th grade endorsing responses of "strongly disagree" or "disagree".
- For service delivery and progress monitoring, we observe trends to suggest that
 caregivers experience a decrease in satisfaction with increasing grade level, as
 evidenced by lower proportions endorsing responses of "strongly agree" or "agree" for
 the measures of:
 - Effective progress and progress measurement
 - Current IEP/504 plan meeting needs and being followed by school

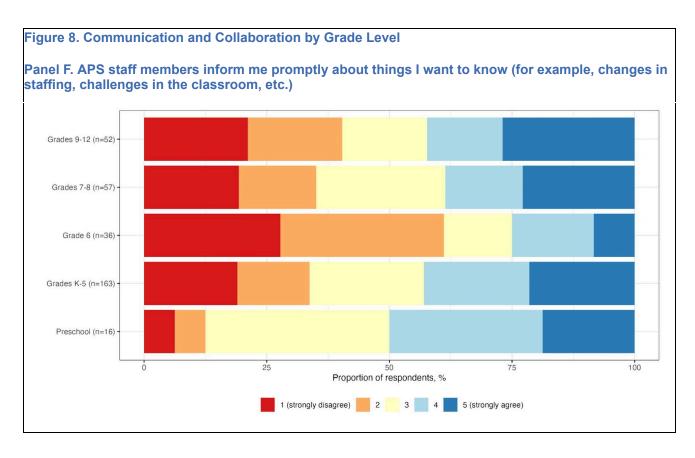


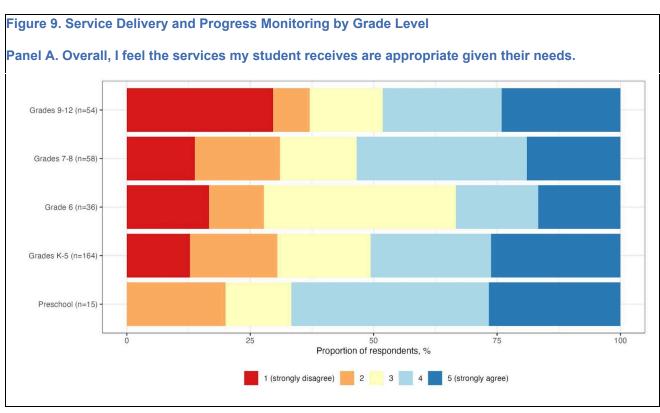


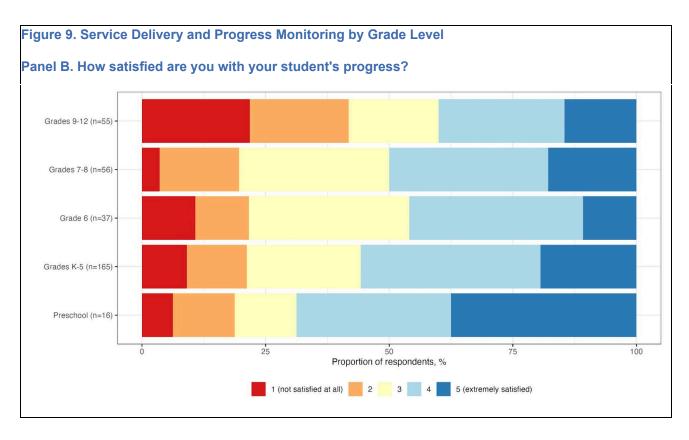


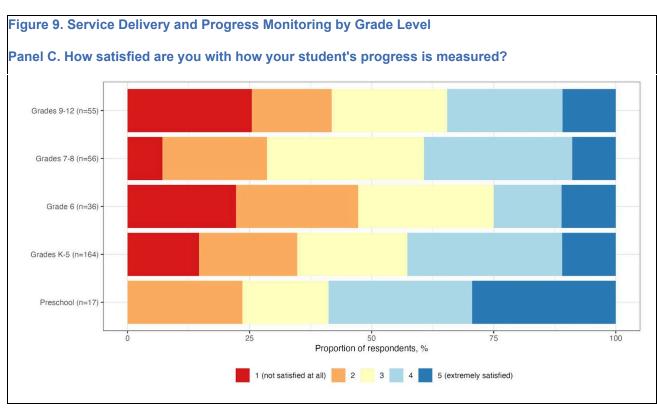


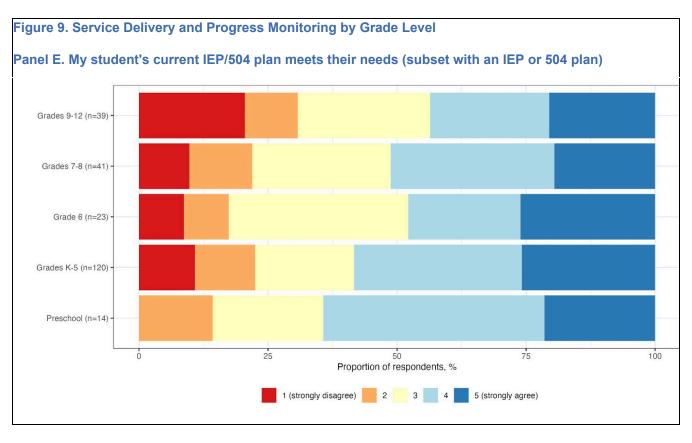


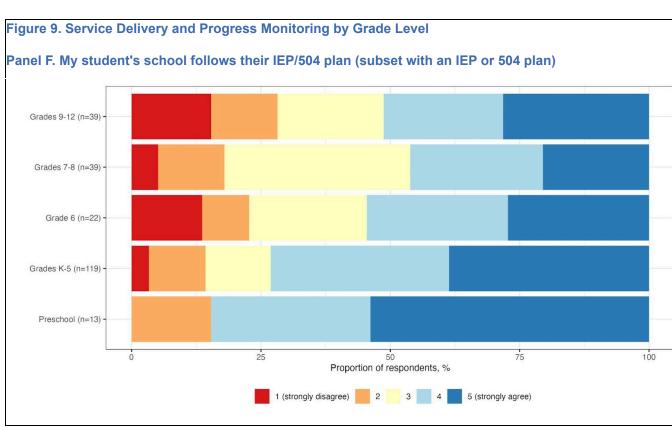












Current Year Breakdown by Current Services and IEP Eligibility Category

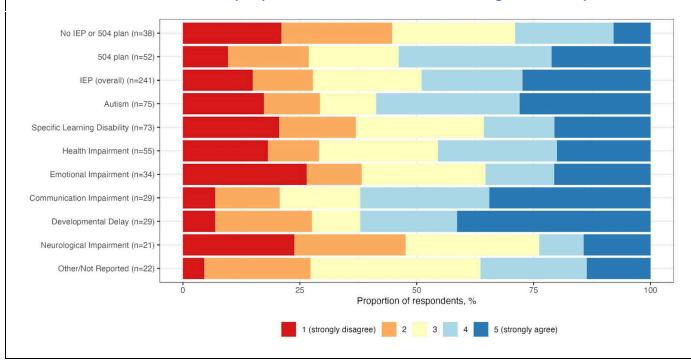


Figure 11. Communication and Collaboration by Current Services (first 3 bars, mutually exclusive) and by IEP eligibility category (all other bars, not mutually exclusive).

Detailed subgroup analyses by current services and IEP eligibility category for "Communication and Collaboration" and "Service Delivery and Progress Monitoring" are displayed in Figure 11 and Figure 12, respectively. Responses are first separated by current services (first 3 bars, mutually exclusive); and then by IEP eligibility category (all other bars, not mutually exclusive).

We observe variability in responses by current services, with caregivers of students with a current IEP or 504 plan having more favorable experiences than those of students without. This result is not unexpected and is likely explained by several factors, including caregivers being early in the process (e.g., with students currently undergoing evaluation), and differences of opinion between caregivers and APS regarding service eligibility.

We also observe variability in responses by disability with the following notable observation:

- For several items, lower proportions of caregivers of students eligible for an IEP reported responses of "strongly agree" or "agree"for the following categories:
 - o SLD
 - Health impairment
 - o Emotional Impairment, and/or
 - Neurological Impairment

Panel A. I feel I am included as an equal partner with teachers and other Arlington Schools professionals.

Panel B. I know who to contact at APS with questions/concerns regarding my student's educational experience

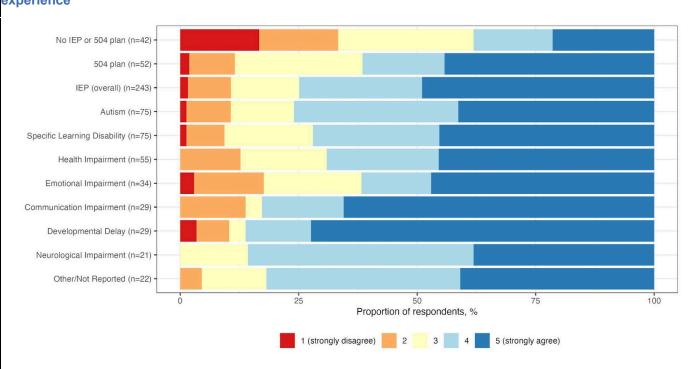


Figure 11. Communication and Collaboration by Current Services (first 3 bars, mutually exclusive) and by IEP eligibility category (all other bars, not mutually exclusive).

Panel C. I feel comfortable contacting APS staff with questions/concerns regarding my student's educational experience

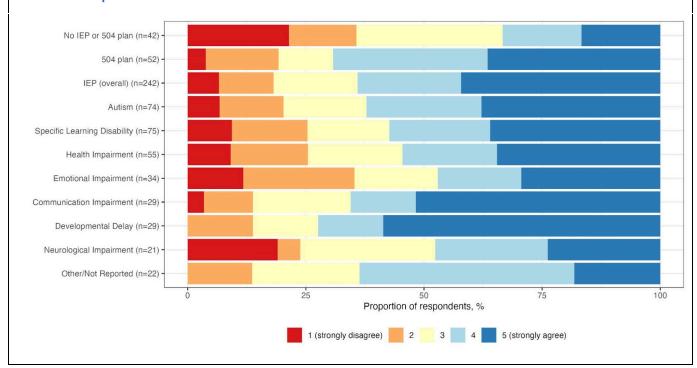


Figure 11. Communication and Collaboration by Current Services (first 3 bars, mutually exclusive) and by IEP eligibility category (all other bars, not mutually exclusive).

Panel D. When I reach out to an APS staff member, I receive a reply or acknowledgement within 2 school working days

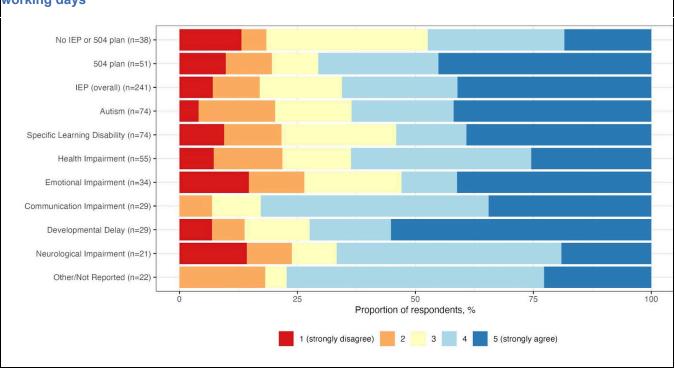


Figure 11. Communication and Collaboration by Current Services (first 3 bars, mutually exclusive) and by IEP eligibility category (all other bars, not mutually exclusive).

Future Survey Goals and Next Steps

1. Expand the reach and use of the SEPAC Annual Survey. This survey is only as effective as it is helpful to the operations and planning of the Arlington Public Schools. As such, SEPAC hopes to collaborate with the School Committee, Superintendent Dr. Elizabeth Homan, and Assistant Superintendent of Student Services, Alison Elmer to expand the reach of the survey and determine actionable next steps based on results that will support the successful implementation of the <u>District's Five-year Strategic Plan</u>,

Expanding the reach of the survey to a broader range of caregivers of students with disabilities should include, but is not limited to:

- o improved representation across racial and ethnic groups
- increased survey participation from caregivers of students at Ottoson and Arlington High School.
- better capturing the experiences of caregivers of students who have a disability but do not currently receive accommodations or direct services.
- better capturing the experiences of caregivers of students undergoing a 3-year evaluation and/or transitioning off of an IEP or 504 plan.
- 2. **Design and implement a parent-informed system or database** for capturing specific, concrete, effective practices and tools that are serving students and families well. This will help all stakeholders identify best practices which are already being used in the district and create an opportunity for creative and collaborative idea sharing.
- Increase the number of in-person and virtual events in response to survey respondents'
 desire for more community-building opportunities and education on topics related
 to special education.
- 4. Create the **SEPAC awards** to recognize outstanding in-district providers who have made a positive impact on APS students and families.

Overall classification: All Massachusetts districts and schools with sufficient data are classified into one of two accountability categories: districts and schools requiring assistance or intervention, and districts and schools not requiring assistance or intervention. The reason(s) for the district's or school's classification are noted on this report.

Progress toward improvement targets: The criterion-referenced target percentage combines multiple years of data related to achievement, growth, high school completion, English learner progress, advanced coursework completion, and chronic absenteeism into a single number between o and 100. For a group to be considered to be meeting targets it must have a cumulative criterion-referenced target percentage of 75% or higher.

The **annual criterion-referenced target percentage** is calculated by dividing the weighted total points earned by the weighted total possible points. The calculation for each is displayed below.

Weighted total of points earned = (Total achievement points earned x Achievement weight) + (Total growth points earned x Growth weight) + (Total high school completion points earned x high school completion weight) + (EL progress points earned x EL progress weight) + (Total additional indicator points earned x Additional indicator weight)

The **cumulative criterion-referenced target percentage** represents a weighted average of the annual criterion-referenced target percentages. At a minimum, a group must have an annual criterion-referenced target percentage for the most recent year in order to receive a cumulative percentage.

Accountability percentile: An accountability percentile between 1 and 99 is reported for most schools. This number is an indication of the school's overall performance relative to other schools that serve similar grades, and is calculated using multiple years of data for all accountability indicators. School percentiles are not calculated for districts.

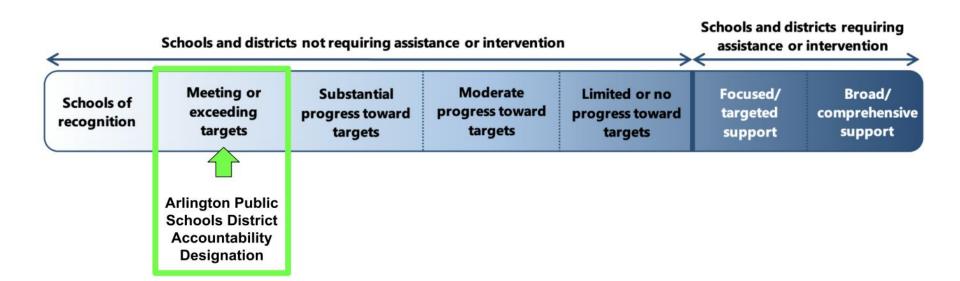

Student Growth



Student Growth Percentiles (SGPs) provide a measure of the degree to which a student's achievement has changed from the prior year(s) to the current year, in comparison to other students in the same grade who performed similarly in the past. SGPs use students' current and prior scores to assign an SGP that ranges from 1 to 99.

- Mean SGP of 1-19 = Very Low Growth
- Mean SGP of 20-39 = Low Growth
- Mean SGP of 40-59 = Typical Growth
- Mean SGP of 60-79 = High Growth
- Mean SGP of 80-99 = Very High Growth

Year-Over-Year and Cohort Data



Throughout the presentation, we will show both year-over-year and cohort data for both achievement and growth. We will show this for *all students* and for students in APS *focal groups*.

- **Year-over-Year** data is showing changes for *different students* in each year; for example, it might show the achievement of all students in grades 3-5 over four years. These will be different students in the first year than in the fourth year, because of matriculation. Year-over-year data is best for assessing the effectiveness of the system and the impact of interventions on schools over longer spans of time, regardless of attrition or changes in the student population.
- Cohort data tracks a single cohort of students through multiple years. These visualizations *only* show students who are currently enrolled in APS, and shows their progress over the past several years of testing. There will be a gap in these data in years they did not take an MCAS test (for example, in 9th grade). Cohort data is best for assessing the impact of an intervention over time with a specific group of students, and is useful to triangulate against year-over-year trends. Cohort trends that track across subject areas may indicate something about the general student experience, for example, or could help to explain a dip or jump in year-over-year outcomes.

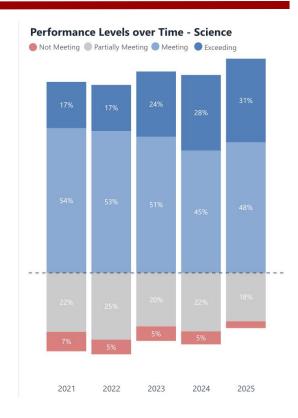


Arlington uses %Meeting/Exceeding as our measure for achievement. Our goal is to have as high of a percentage of students meeting or exceeding standards on MCAS as possible.

Growth Percentiles are *always* relative to statewide growth in the cohort, and the statewide SGP is set at 50% (except in 2021)

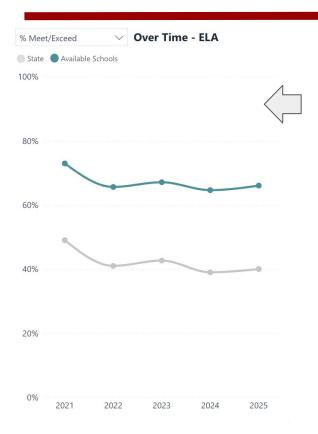

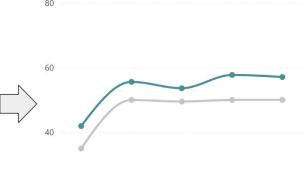

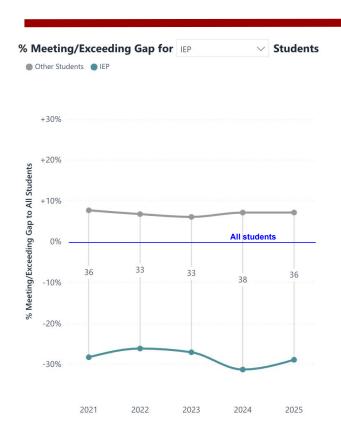

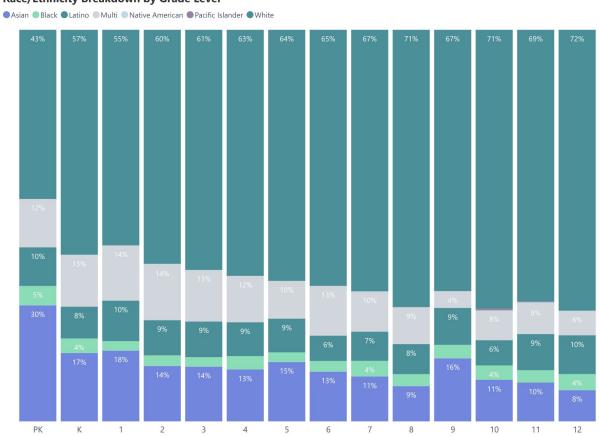

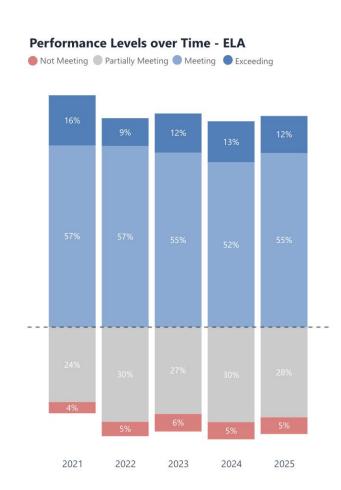

Elementary ELA: Cohort Trends



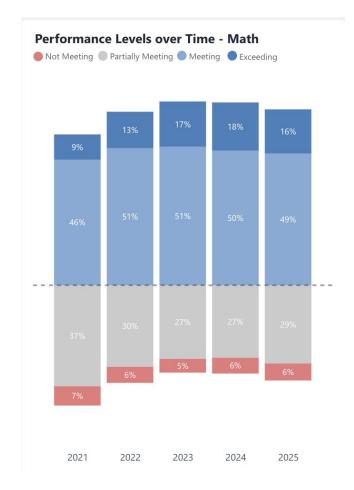

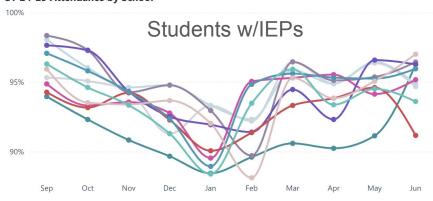




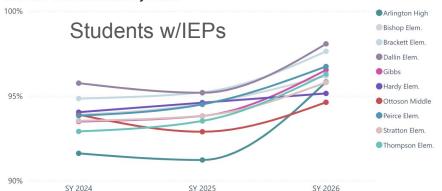
Year over Year Attendance by School



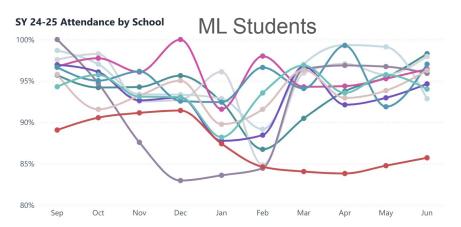

File: JJE - STUDENT FUND-RAISING ACTIVITIES

While the School Committee recognizes that fundraising activities have become a part of the school environment at all levels, the Committee wishes to ensure that students are not exploited by the process.

The Committee supports student involvement in the sale of tickets to scheduled athletic events, school dramatic and musical performances, and other school events where sales are required. Also, student publications which require the sale of advertising to sustain themselves and serve the student body and/or the community may involve students in such sales.

Charitable fundraising activities, especially those that are part of a community service event or program are encouraged provided such proposals are submitted to and approved by both the building Principal and the Superintendent.

Other fundraising activities that wish to involve students in the fundraising process shall be submitted to the Superintendent for approval.

For safety reasons and because the School Committee recognizes that community members receive requests for support from many worthy causes, activities such as canning and door-to-door sales are strongly discouraged.

Fundraising activities may not involve competitions among students. Individual students may not be rewarded with additional recess, snacks, activities or any type of prize for having raised larger amounts of funds or reaching fundraising goals.

Students and student groups are barred by state law and regulation from organizing raffles or games of chance, participating in sales of, or purchasing tickets of such games.

No money collections of any kind may be held in the schools without the specific consent of the Superintendent.

File: FF - POLICY FOR SPECIAL DEDICATIONS OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

Naming a school is an important matter that deserves thoughtful attention. Personal prejudice or favoritism, political pressure, or temporary popularity should not be an influence in choosing a name. It is expected that an orderly, announced procedure will lessen the community or factional pressures that so quickly build up when the selection is delayed or seems uncertain.

From time to time the School Committee may choose to recognize outstanding service to the youth of Arlington by dedicating or naming an appropriate area (i.e. playground, library, gymnasium, auditorium etc.) in honor of some exceptional individual(s) who have unselfishly given their time and energy in promoting excellence in education.

At the request of the Superintendent or any individual School Committee member the Chairperson will place a dedication request on the agenda of a regular school committee meeting for discussion and a vote to refer via letter from the Chairperson such request to the Public-Memorial Committee for an advisory opinion. The Chairperson will place such a proposal before the Committee as soon as the Committee has sufficient biographical and/or other data available to enable the full Committee to adequately reflect or deliberate a formal motion of dedication. Upon receipt of the Public Memorial Committee's advisory opinion or at least thirty days after the referral to the Public Memorial Committee, whichever is sooner, the Chairperson will again place the request on the agenda for a final vote.

If the School Committee approves a dedication, this will be followed as soon as possible by a formal dedication. The ceremony should encompass a presentation of an official proclamation and the placement of an appropriate plaque to commemorate the individuals' significant contribution to the Arlington Public Schools. A certain sensitivity and common sense must be reflected in the timing of any public recognition.

It is the policy of the School Committee that the names of existing structures or physical spacesunder our jurisdiction will not be changed. Historical preservation and respect for our traditionsare a key component in honoring our past.

The Arlington School Committee recognizes that it is traditional to designate spaces in school buildings with the names of important members of the educational community. The Arlington School Committee has the authority to name spaces under its jurisdiction. The school committee has established a policy to seek an advisory opinion from the Public Memorial Committee prior to any vote to name spaces under the jurisdiction of the school committee.

This policy is meant to provide procedural guidance for naming and commemorations of facilities and spaces under the jurisdiction of the Arlington Public Schools.

At the request of the Superintendent or any individual School Committee member the Chairperson will place a dedication request on the agenda of a regular school committee meeting for referral to a Superintendent's Advisory Panel on Naming and Memorials. This will be an adhoc panel with no more than 11 members. The Superintendent shall create and convene a panel as needed to review referrals from the school committee. Membership will vary based on the building and space under consideration. The panel would include a minimum of one representative from each of the following:

- 1. The Superintendent's Leadership Team
- 2. The School Committee, by vote of the school committee
- 3. A school administrator from the facility where the naming is under consideration.
- 4. One or two staff members from the facility where the naming is under consideration.
- 5. In the event of a naming of a space on the Arlington High School campus, a student representative, selected by the student government.
- 6. One or two parent/community members from the school, by vote of the School Council or School Committee, whichever is appropriate.

The advisory committee shall review the criteria for naming decisions, consult with the Arlington Public Memorial Committee, manage a process for receiving and reviewing proposals, and make recommendations to the School Committee.

Criteria for Names

The Arlington School Committee seeks to create an inclusive process and guidelines for making recommendations for naming facilities in ways that honor the legacy and values of the Arlington Public Schools.

As has been past practice, it is our intent to name spaces after members of the Arlington School Community who have made contributions to the education of students and the mission of the Arlington Public Schools. These would include staff, alumni, or Arlington educators.

This criteria allows for naming of spaces after living people, but this policy recommends that the committee not recommend to name spaces for people who are critically ill or until 3 years after their passing. This helps to allow for the community to process a death without creating conflict around the naming in the midst of grief.

When the Advisory Panel approves a recommendation, it shall be forwarded to the Public Memorial Committee for an advisory opinion. Upon receipt of the Public Memorial Committee's advisory opinion, or at least thirty days after the referral to the Public Memorial Committee, whichever is sooner, the Chairperson of the School Committee will again place the request on the agenda for a final vote. The agenda will contain sufficient biographical and/or other data available to enable the full Committee to adequately reflect or deliberate a formal motion of dedication.

If the School Committee approves a dedication or naming, this will be followed as soon as possible by a formal ceremony to recognize the dedication. The ceremony should encompass a presentation of an official proclamation and the placement of an appropriate plaque to commemorate the individuals' significant contribution to the Arlington Public Schools. A certain sensitivity and common sense must be reflected in the timing of any public recognition.

It is the policy of the School Committee that the names of existing structures or physical spaces under our jurisdiction should not be changed. Historical preservation and respect for our traditions are a key component in honoring our past.

The School Committee will cooperate with other schools and with local, state, and regional agencies and organizations to:

- 1. Seek solutions of educational problems of common concern.
- 2. Offer support services of high quality to our children.
- 3. Equalize educational opportunities for all children.
- 4. Acquire federal and state grants.
- 5. Promote local school system involvement in state and federal decision-making.

This cooperation may extend to research, providing transportation for children to special schools and hospitals, coordination of curriculum, exchange of information and data, construction of facilities that may be efficiently used on a cooperative basis, and the coordination of school calendars and activities.

Before joining any cooperative programs, education collaborative, or participating in any joint educational services with other school systems, the School Committee wants to be sure that in all instances the best interests of our school children will be served. In carrying out this policy the Superintendent will include in reports to the Committee an evaluation of the desirability and feasibility of cooperation with other schools and agencies on matters of mutual interest.

The Superintendent shall maintain a working relationship with the Superintendent of the Minuteman Regional Vocational-Technical School District for the purpose of making career opportunities information available to middle school students and their parent/guardians.

Massachusetts state regulations require sending districts to maintain a districtwide Middle School Pathway Exploration Policy that documents how middle school students in the district are made aware of, and gain exposure to, career technical education (CTE) schools and programs available to them in their district, regional, agricultural, and other public high schools.

Collaboration

The Arlington Public Schools will collaborate with the Minuteman Regional Technical Vocational High School, and any other regional, agricultural, or public high schools eligible to enroll Arlington students, to inform students about such opportunities to them by:

- Ensuring that all eighth-grade students are invited to take part in a tour day during regular middle school hours as offered by a public high school to which Arlington students may apply.
- Ensuring that any middle school student absence for an opportunity to tour, during regular middle school hours, is excused without penalty.
- Ensuring that the Arlington Public Schools sets dates for middle school on-site presentations that will be shared on the public facing website for all middle school students that includes information about career technical education programs and careers, including presentations, as well as through mail, email, and on their public facing websites, by October 15 of each school year.

High School Pathway Options Available to Students

Student in Arlington have the option of applying for the seats available at the Minuteman Regional Vocational Technical High School. Minuteman is a "wall to wall" Career and Technical Education public school, where students can earn both a high school diploma and industry recognized credentials in alignment with a student's secondary and post-secondary academic and career planning in the following areas:

- Advanced Manufacturing
- Automotive Technology
- Biotechnology
- Carpentry
- Computer Science and Cybersecurity
- Cosmetology
- Culinary Arts and Hospitality
- Design and Visual Communications
- Early Education and Teaching
- Electrical
- Engineering and Robotics
- Environmental Science
- Health Assisting
- Horticulture and Plant Sciences
- Metal Fabrication and Welding
- Multimedia Production
- Plumbing
- Veterinary Science

Providing records to CTE Schools and programs

If a request for information is sent with a signed parent release from the Minuteman Regional Vocational Technical High School, or from any regional, agricultural, or other public high school, the Arlington Public Schools will provide the requested information regarding attendance and discipline within ten school days to ensure that the student's application may be completed and processed in a timely manner.

Maintenance of Records

The Arlington Public Schools will maintain documentation of student participation in tours and other elements of this policy implementation such as sharing of contact information, MyCAP, and CTE access schedules. The Arlington Public Schools will provide this information to the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education upon request.

Last week, we had the pleasure of sharing our new Standard Response Protocol (SRP) for emergency response and communication with members of our community in a community webinar. The webinar is now accessible at this link. If you are prompted to provide a passcode, it is 3N6?6cTk.

Although we experienced some audio challenges during the live session, we are pleased that the recording has clear audio. You can also access the slides here.

During the presentation, we shared the five actions that are part of the new SRP, as well as some of the steps we have taken in partnership with the Arlington Police Department and Facilities teams to update door locks and communications infrastructure over the past year. The five actions in the SRP are outlined briefly here.

Specific resources that we know will be of interest to community members as we implement our new protocols include our emergency communications protocol, a live and routinely updated Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) doc, a form to submit your questions, and other public resources. A system of action-based, shared language used by students, staff, and first responders to ensure clear and consistent communication during a crisis.

- Teachers- Sweep hallway for nearby students.
- All students and teachers remain in their classrooms until the hold is released.
- If outside, stay outside
- Business as usual inside the classroom
- "The Hold is released, All Clear" Said by public address
- *During a HOLD, the halls are cleared, students remain in their classrooms with their teachers and business continues as usual. If people are outside they remain outside.



"SECURE, GET INSIDE, LOCK OUTSIDE DOORS"

- · Called when there is a threat or hazard outside of the building.
- Secure uses the security of the physical facility to act as protection NO ONE is allowed IN or OUT!
- Locking all outside access points. Class or recess outside is immediately ordered into the building.
- Increased law enforcement presence

LOCKDOWN

LOCKS, LIGHTS, OUT OF SIGHT!

- Uses classroom and school Security actions to protect students and staff from the threat
- Locking individual classroom doors, offices and other securable areas, moving occupants out of line of sight of corridor windows, turning off lights to make it seem unoccupied, and maintaining silence
- Do not be exposed to unnecessary risk
- Every individual teacher is responsible for their own classroom lockdown
- Students/faculty outside of classrooms should go into the nearest room

ANYONE CAN CALL A LOCKDOWN

- A "SAFE ZONE" should also be identified within the classroom that is out of sight of interior windows (if possible)
- Teachers and students do not open the door for anyone during a lockdown. First responders accompanied by admin staff will come get you.

CELL PHONE USE: PLEASE LIMIT USE TO PREVENT NETWORK CONGESTION AND THE SPREAD OF FALSE INFORMATION. STAFF AND STUDENTS STAYING OFF PHONES HELPS ENSURE CRITICAL COMMUNICATION CHANNELS REMAIN OPEN AND ACCURATE INFORMATION IS SHARED.



ACTION 4 - EVACUATE

- Called when there is a need to move students/faculty from one location to another for safety reasons
- Teachers/students move quickly in orderly fashion
- If there is a violent/traumatic event there will almost always be an off site evacuation due to the school potentially being a crime scene



ACTION 5 - SHELTER

Called when specific protective actions are needed based on a threat or hazard

- Drop, cover, hold
- Get to high ground

- "Hold in Your Room or Area".
- "Secure Get Inside, Lock Outside Doors, continue with classroom activity".

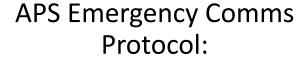

ILUG Standard Response Protocol Procedures: Frequently Asked Questions (and our Answers)

Background:

In 2025, APS implemented new Standard Response Protocols from the *i love u guys Foundation*, an organization that uses research-based approaches to ensure school safety in any emergency situation, whether it involves one student or an entire community. The Frequently Asked Questions that follow are submitted by staff and families on this form, and questions are categorized thematically for ease of navigation. We will add questions and answers periodically as new questions come in. Please check back for more information!

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General Procedural Questions

Q: Should classroom doors to the hallway be locked, even if the room is empty?

A: Yes. All doors leading to hallways should remain **shut and locked** at all times, including when classrooms are unoccupied.

Q: Is it helpful to add the local police department (APD) to our phone favorites for emergencies, or should we just call 911?

A: Technology has advanced in emergency response systems, and **911 is the most effective and efficient way to request help**. There's no longer a need to call the local police station directly.

Q: How will emergency information be communicated during off-campus activities (e.g., PE walking or biking)?

A: Emergency communication will be sent via radios, PA systems, and electronic alerts. If you are returning during a critical incident, law enforcement will direct you to a safe location.

Q: How are we handling any issues that may involve ICE?

A: Please refer to district guidance or consult with administration for protocols related to ICE involvement.

Q: What's the expected method of communication to alert administrators immediately about an emergency or support need?

A: Use radios if one has been issued to you or is readily available. Otherwise, use a cell phone or any other communication device available to call the front office of the building where you are located. **For emergencies requiring immediate police/fire response, call 911.**



Q: How often are interior (including classroom) and external doors are checked for working, installed locking (from inside) mechanisms, by whom, and in what manner.

A: The door locks to classrooms are tested several times per week, if not daily. Custodians lock the doors behind them after going through the school, or use their keys to access classrooms, as do our teachers and administrators. We're confident in the functioning of all of interior door locks, because we use and therefore test them every day.

Exterior door locks are also tested daily with staff, students, and families going in and out of the schools. When an exterior entry door isn't working, my office is notified immediately and it is treated as a safety threat (highest priority) by facilities. All of the other exterior doors (such as egress doors that aren't used for building entry) are heavy doors that close behind you and are locked at all times. When any exterior door doesn't close, or if they are breached when the building is locked down, they will set off an alarm that alerts the police department.

HOLD Questions

Q: During a "Hold" situation, should we notify administration if we have extra students?

A: Yes. After taking attendance, you should continue monitoring accountability. Notify administration if you have additional or missing students. Your building's response team will provide specific protocols for attendance tracking.

LOCKDOWN Questions

Q: Are we still barricading rooms during a lockdown?

A: Once the door is securely locked, additional measures such as placing furniture in front of the door can be helpful **if time allows**. However, the most critical actions are:

- Locks Ensure doors are locked
- **Lights** Turn off the lights
- Out of Sight Move out of visibility from doors/windows.



The goal is to make it unclear to an intruder whether anyone is present behind the door.

Q: Should there be locks on interior doors between adjacent classrooms?

A: No. Building and fire codes prohibit locking doors between adjoining classrooms. If there is suspicious or violent activity in the neighboring room, you may use furniture to barricade the interior door.

Q: Can shades or covers be provided for the long windows in classroom doors?

A: Yes, when this is necessary to comply with "Locks, Lights, out of Sight," the district can provide shades or covers for windows or classroom doors. However, the presence of windows in doors and walls is also a safety feature designed to protect both students and staff members. **Interior windows should NOT be covered except in an emergency.** Please speak with your building principal if you have concerns about your ability to implement the Lockdown protocol.

Q: Will the gym receive new doors that can be locked without a key? What's the lockdown protocol in the gym?

A: Ideally, you should move behind a locked solid core door (e.g., PE office or storage closet), or evacuate to an external point out of the line of sight from the building. Gym doors should be kept locked during the day, using a wedge for functional student access. During lockdown, remove the wedge and close the door to secure the space.

Q: Will officers fully clear all rooms during a lockdown release, including inner offices?

A: Yes. Police will check and clear **every space**, including closets, restrooms, and inner offices.

Q: Are we still teaching students to barricade and "counter" intruders (the "C" in ALICE)?

A: The most important prevention is to **lock the door**. However, if an intruder gains access to your area, you may use **any means necessary** to defend yourself and your students. Note: ILUG research indicates **no intruder has breached a locked, solid core door** during a critical incident.



Q: What should we do if a student has a medical emergency during a lockdown (e.g., passes out)?

A: Call 911 and relay the emergency. Emergency responders will be dispatched appropriately.

EVACUATION Questions

Q: What evacuation plan is in place for students with disabilities?

A: APD and AFD are trained and prepared to evacuate individuals with mobility challenges. Staff will also be trained and provided with the necessary materials to support evacuation for these students. The district has purchased resources for programs that require accessible evacuation solutions (for example, a device to assist navigation of stairs) where they are needed. If you work or have a child with specialized needs and are unsure what the plan would be for maintaining student safety, please consult your building administrator.

Q: What if the only safe exit is a window, but the window no longer opens fully?

A: If necessary and no other safe exit is available, you may break the window to evacuate.

Q: Will classrooms receive materials to seal door edges in the event of a gas hazard?

A: In the case of a hazardous materials incident, we will follow the **EVACUATE** protocol and leave the building. Sealing materials are not part of the current plan.

OPEN MEETING LAW COMPLAINT FORM

Instructions for completing the Open Meeting Law Complaint Form

The Attorney General's Division of Open Government interprets and enforces the Open Meeting Law, Chapter 30A of the Massachusetts General Laws, Sections 18-25. Below is the procedure for filing and responding to an Open Meeting Law complaint.

Instructions for filing a complaint:

- o Fill out the attached two-page form completely. Sign and date the second page. File the complaint with the public body within 30 days of the alleged violation. If the violation was not reasonably discoverable at the time it occurred, you must file the complaint within 30 days of the date the violation was reasonably discoverable. A violation that occurs during an open session of a meeting is reasonably discoverable on the date of the meeting.
- o To file the complaint:
 - o For a local or municipal public body, you must submit a copy of the complaint to the <u>chair of the public body</u> **AND** to the <u>municipal clerk</u>.
 - o For all other public bodies, you must submit a copy of the complaint to the chair of the public body.
 - o Complaints may be filed by mail, by email, or by hand. Please retain a copy for your records.
- o If the public body does not respond within 14 business days and does not request an extension to respond, contact the Division for further assistance.

Instructions for a public body that receives a complaint:

- o The chair must disseminate the complaint to the members of the public body.
- o The public body must meet to review the complaint within 14 business days (usually 20-22 calendar days).
- After review, but within 14 business days, the public body must respond to the complaint in writing and must send the complainant a response and a description of any action the public body has taken to address the allegations in the complaint. At the same time, the body must send the Attorney General a copy of the complaint and a copy of the response. The public body may delegate this responsibility to an individual member of the public body, its counsel, or a staff member, but only after the public body has met to review the complaint.
- o If a public body requires more time to review the complaint and respond, it may request an extension of time for good cause by contacting the Division of Open Government.

Once the public body has responded to the complaint:

- o If you are not satisfied with the public body's response to your complaint, you may file a copy of the complaint with the Division by mail, by email, or by hand, but only once you have waited for 30 days after filing the complaint with the public body. Mail may be sent to: The Division of Open Government, Office of the Attorney General, One Ashburton Place 20th Floor, Boston, MA 02108. Emails may be sent to: openmeeting@state.ma.us.
- o When you file your complaint with the Division, please include the complaint form and all documentation relevant to the alleged violation. You may wish to attach a cover letter explaining why the public body's response does not adequately address your complaint.
- o The Division will not review complaints filed with us more than 90 days after the violation, unless we granted an extension to the public body or you can demonstrate good cause for the delay.

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File: FF - POLICY FOR SPECIAL DEDICATIONS OF SCHOOL FACILITIES

Naming a school is an important matter that deserves thoughtful attention. Personal prejudice or favoritism, political pressure, or temporary popularity should not be an influence in choosing a name. It is expected that an orderly, announced procedure will lessen the community or factional pressures that so quickly build up when the selection is delayed or seems uncertain.

From time to time the School Committee may choose to recognize outstanding service to the youth of Arlington by dedicating or naming an appropriate area (i.e. playground, library, gymnasium, auditorium etc.) in honor of some exceptional individual(s) who have unselfishly given their time and energy in promoting excellence in education.

At the request of the Superintendent or any individual School Committee member the Chairperson will place a dedication request on the agenda of a regular school committee meeting for discussion and a vote to refer via letter from the Chairperson such request to the Public Memorial Committee for an advisory opinion. The Chairperson will place such a proposal before the Committee as soon as the Committee has sufficient biographical and/or other data available to enable the full Committee to adequately reflect or deliberate a formal motion of dedication. Upon receipt of the Public Memorial Committee's advisory opinion or at least thirty days after the referral to the Public Memorial Committee, whichever is sooner, the Chairperson will again place the request on the agenda for a final vote.

If the School Committee approves a dedication, this will be followed as soon as possible by a formal dedication. The ceremony should encompass a presentation of an official proclamation and the placement of an appropriate plaque to commemorate the individuals' significant contribution to the Arlington Public Schools. A certain sensitivity and common sense must be reflected in the timing of any public recognition.

It is the policy of the School Committee that the names of existing structures or physical spaces under our jurisdiction will not be changed. Historical preservation and respect for our traditions are a key component in honoring our past.

Mary E. (Liz) McDonough - Wood Gym - Arlington High School

A pioneer in gender equity in athletics, Liz McDonough began her career in Arlington in the early 1970s, advocating for girls' sports during the implementation of Title IX and Chapter 622. She became Arlington's first Coordinator of Girls' Athletics in 1974, later serving as Director of Athletics for both girls' and boys' programs. A standout athlete, coach, and official, Liz also chaired multiple statewide committees for the MIAA and helped shape athletics policy across Massachusetts. Through decades of leadership and mentorship, she inspired generations of student-athletes and helped build a more inclusive, balanced athletic culture at Arlington High School.

Brian H. Rehrig - Black Box Theater - Arlington High School

Brian H. Rehrig was a beloved civic leader, arts advocate, and environmental steward whose decades of service helped shape Arlington and its schools. A longtime Town Meeting Member and AHS Building Committee member, he co-chaired the Performing Arts Subcommittee and championed the creation of the Black Box Theater. A gifted pianist, sound designer, and music director, Brian contributed to dozens of local productions and served for over 25 years on the board of Arlington Friends of the Drama. His life reflected the values of creativity, inclusion, and public service that define the mission of Arlington High School.

Charles A. Skidmore - Principal's Conference Room - Arlington High School

As principal of Arlington High School from 2004 to 2011, Charles Skidmore was a compassionate and student-centered leader who championed equity and academic opportunity for all students. He was known for his personal connection to the AHS community—attending events, writing individualized letters to students, and even teaching Spanish I while leading the school. Under his leadership, AHS received national academic recognition and expanded access to advanced coursework. His commitment to inclusive values, student success, and community engagement left a lasting legacy at AHS.

2. Review before second reading: File LB and LBA Relations With Other Schools and School Districts.

Files LB and LBA were presented to the school committee at its meeting of October 9, 2025. There was no further discussion under this agenda item.

3. Special Dedications of School Facilities: Files FF, FF-E, and FFA.

The chair and Superintendent Homan presented a draft of a revised File FF, looking to structure the process of special dedications throughout the district based on the model used for new spaces at the high school (File FF-E). The new policy would replace the current FF and FF-E. There was a brief discussion about retaining or eliminating File FFA, or incorporating it into the new FF. After the discussion, it was decided to retain FFA.

On a **motion** by Mr. Kardon, seconded by Ms. Gitelson, it was voted (3-0) to recommend advancing to first reading File FF as revised, and the deletion of File FF-E. **Roll Call:**

4. Community Use of School Facilities: File KF and KFE

The chair presented a package that contained Arlington's current policies (KF and KFE), as well as policies from other districts. The subcommittee liked the first paragraph of Burlington's KF, and suggested it be added to Arlington's policy. The superintendent asked that the option of her designee should be added to the approval process, as many requests are routine.

There was further discussion of KFE, and the grouping of various rentals. It was suggested that ACE (Community Education) should be in Group 4. There was also a discussion of how fees and custodial/energy costs should be incorporated into the rental. There was discussion of the possibility of establishing a fee based on a percentage of revenue for Group 4 rentals.

The superintendent will work with her staff to explore changes to the groupings in KFE, and the agenda item will be brought back at a future meeting.

5. Gifts and Solicitations by Staff – File GBEBC

The chair presented a suggested revision to current policy offered by MASC. There was a discussion pertaining to the acceptance of gifts and supplies, with a concern that trivial

donations similar to tissues for classrooms would be subject to committee approval. Mr. Kardon noted there are some internal conflicts between this policy and File KCD. The chair said he would ask MASC for guidance on the issue of small gifts for classrooms (such as tissues) and get a response before bringing this back to the subcommittee.

6. Student Fundraising Activities – File JJE

The chair presented a suggested revision to current policy offered by MASC. The revision would reflect that state law prohibits participation in raffles or games of chance. The MASC also contains a paragraph that prohibits rewards to individual students based on their success at fundraising. The superintendent requested that her designee could approve fundraising activities in the fourth paragraph.

On a **motion** by Ms. Gitelson, seconded by Mr. Kardon, it was voted (3-0) to recommend advancing to first reading File JJE as revised. **Roll Call:**

It is the policy of the School Committee that the names of existing structures or physical spaces under our jurisdiction will not be changed. Historical preservation and respect for our traditions are a key component in honoring our past.

The Arlington School Committee recognizes that it is traditional to designate spaces in school buildings with the names of important members of the educational community. The Arlington School Committee has the authority to name spaces under its jurisdiction. The school committee has established a policy to seek an advisory opinion from the Public Memorial Committee prior to any vote to name spaces under the jurisdiction of the school committee.

This policy is meant to provide procedural guidance for naming and commemorations of facilities and spaces under the jurisdiction of the Arlington Public Schools.

At the request of the Superintendent or any individual School Committee member the Chairperson will place a dedication request on the agenda of a regular school committee meeting for referral to a Superintendent's Advisory Panel on Naming and Memorials. This will be an adhoc panel with no more than 11 members. The Superintendent shall create and convene a panel as needed to review referrals from the school committee. Membership will vary based on the building and space under consideration. The panel would include a minimum of one representative from each of the following:

1. The Superintendent's Leadership Team

- 2. The School Committee, by vote of the school committee
- 3. A school administrator from the facility where the naming is under consideration.
- 4. One or two staff members from the facility where the naming is under consideration.
- 5. In the event of a naming of a space on the Arlington High School campus, a student representative, selected by the student government.
- 6. One or two parent/community members from the school, by vote of the School Council or School Committee, whichever is appropriate.

The advisory committee shall review the criteria for naming decisions, consult with the Arlington Public Memorial Committee, manage a process for receiving and reviewing proposals, and make recommendations to the School Committee.

Criteria for Names

The Arlington School Committee seeks to create an inclusive process and guidelines for making recommendations for naming facilities in ways that honor the legacy and values of the Arlington Public Schools.

As has been past practice, it is our intent to name spaces after members of the Arlington School Community who have made contributions to the education of students and the mission of the Arlington Public Schools. These would include staff, alumni, or Arlington educators.

This criteria allows for naming of spaces after living people, but this policy recommends that the committee not recommend to name spaces for people who are critically ill or until 3 years after their passing. This helps to allow for the community to process a death without creating conflict around the naming in the midst of grief.

When the Advisory Panel approves a recommendation, it shall be forwarded to the Public Memorial Committee for an advisory opinion. Upon receipt of the Public Memorial Committee's advisory opinion, or at least thirty days after the referral to the Public Memorial Committee, whichever is sooner, the Chairperson of the School Committee will again place the request on the agenda for a final vote. The agenda will contain sufficient biographical and/or other data available to enable the full Committee to adequately reflect or deliberate a formal motion of dedication.

If the School Committee approves a dedication or naming, this will be followed as soon as possible by a formal ceremony to recognize the dedication. The ceremony should encompass a presentation of an official proclamation and the placement of an appropriate plaque to commemorate the individuals' significant contribution to the Arlington Public Schools. A certain sensitivity and common sense must be reflected in the timing of any public recognition.

File: JJE - STUDENT FUND-RAISING ACTIVITIES

While the School Committee recognizes that fundraising activities have become a part of the school environment at all levels, the Committee wishes to ensure that students are not exploited by the process.

The Committee supports student involvement in the sale of tickets to scheduled athletic events, school dramatic and musical performances, and other school events where sales are required. Also, student publications which require the sale of advertising to sustain themselves and serve the student body and/or the community may involve students in such sales.

Charitable fundraising activities, especially those that are part of a community service event or program are encouraged provided such proposals are submitted to and approved by both the building Principal and the Superintendent.

Other fundraising activities that wish to involve students in the fundraising process shall be submitted to the Superintendent for approval.

For safety reasons and because the School Committee recognizes that community members receive requests for support from many worthy causes, activities such as canning and door-to-door sales are strongly discouraged.

Fundraising activities may not involve competitions among students. Individual students may not be rewarded with additional recess, snacks, activities or any type of prize for having raised larger amounts of funds or reaching fundraising goals.

Students and student groups are barred by state law and regulation from organizing raffles or games of chance, participating in sales of, or purchasing tickets of such games.

No money collections of any kind may be held in the schools without the specific consent of the Superintendent.

The Town Manager Act of Arlington provides that:

"When a vacancy occurs in the membership of the School Committee, the remaining members of the School Committee shall, after a one week's notice, fill such vacancy by ballot. A majority of the ballots of the members entitled to vote shall be necessary to such election. The person so appointed shall perform the duties of the office until the next annual election, at which the voters shall elect a member of the School Committee for the remainder of the un-expired term."

The School Committee shall by majority vote commence the process described below to fill the vacancy.

- 1. The School Committee shall inform the public through all available media, including the School Department's website, that a position on the School Committee is vacant. Per the Town Manager's Act, the opening shall be posted for one week.
- 2. The notice of vacancy shall invite all residents of the Town who are interested in serving to submit an application for membership on the Committee by a date certain. The notice shall include the date and time at which candidates can speak about their candidacy before an open meeting of the School Committee.
- 3. Said application shall include a statement of the candidate's reasons for serving on the Committee, a resume, and any other information the candidate wishes to present regarding his or her interest in serving on the School Committee.
- 4. All candidates for membership on the Committee shall be invited to an open meeting to make a case for their appointment, and each member of the School Committee may ask the candidates questions. The appearance of the candidates will be determined by lot prior to the first speaker. The order of the questions from School Committee members shall be by rotation. The Chair of the School Committee has the discretion to set an appropriate time limit for each candidate's presentation and for questioning by the School Committee.
- 5. Once all candidates have presented, the School Committee shall take a roll call vote to select the new member. Balloting shall continue until one candidate secures a majority. The candidate with the least amount of votes shall be excluded in the next round of balloting. Upon winning a majority, the new member shall begin service on the School Committee after taking the oath of office.
