Reinvesting in Our School Libraries

Renewed Commitment to Information Literacy and School Libraries

K-8 libraries staffed by full time library paraprofessionals

First certified library teacher was hired for K-5 in fall 2019

Second certified library teacher was hired in spring 2021

District funding for library collections was reinstated in SY19-20 and SY20-21

Updating and Diversifying Library Collections

Added over 1,200 books per building in the past two years

Selected according to district priorities and library needs, identified in collaboration with stakeholders at all levels

- diversity, equity, and inclusion
- social emotional learning
- underrepresented groups in STEM
- current non-fiction resources
- promoting a love of reading






GSA Book of the Month: Carry On


Our May book of the month is one of my favorite authors! And if you like this one, there's a sequel.

Supported teachers and students with online resources and educational technology


Circulated print books at all schools





You can see a book just through the door. It looks like it's called Code Talker.


World History in Context sounds like the name of a research database. What could it mean? You look down at your phone when it vibrates again.




