Writing a Book Review

Book reviews are a great way to share the Books you love and discover new favorities. Here are a few suggestions for writing an engaging and useful review for the AHS READS community.

- . Catch the reader's attention (strong thesis, intriguing idea, quantation, question)
- State your thesis (your opinion of the book) No assignment header, pleased (for AVIS READS community).

· Provide a brief summary (without giring too much away) . Support your opinion of the book with concrete examples and evidence

. Plaish with a recommendation (who would enjoy this book or not, with clear reasoning)

- . No mere than 1,000 characters or one self-developed paragraph (for AHS READS.
- Clear and concins, with a style that makes the review interesting.
- Color and concrete, not a sign that making not invested strategy and coloring.
 Firm and assertive, not wishy-washy, with concrete details to support YOUR opinions (problem or regardles), as long as you can back it up?
- Not oure what to talk about? Consider these possibilities:
- Gives nothing away that would spoil the reader's especience . Free of errors in spelling, punctuation, spaintalization, and grammar

- . There: the lessons taught, big ideas, questions raised
- Connections: to other books, year own life, or the world
 Style: describe the author's voice, what you liked or distilled about it
 Characters: believable or not, give a sense of personalties through words or actions
